MUSINGS

Our "indivisible" nation is testing the limits of what it means to be one nation with many facets. Our pledge to ensure "liberty and justice for all" is sometimes more platitude than reality. New movements, both local and nationally, are organizing in a desperate attempt to recapture some of indivisibleness that has escaped us, and redefining the meaning of "all" when it comes to liberty and justice.

In such times, the church in general, and New England Church in particular, plays a key role in keeping the discussion and the responses civil and focused. The teachings of Jesus and the Biblical prophets to welcome the stranger, provide for the refugee, and otherwise care for those who are the least of the least are at the heart of our belief system. And though politics and religion are sometimes strange bedfellows, both are about the welfare of people, which means we should all be involved.



Historically, this church has been vitally involved in social issues. In 1858, when the church was organized, I noted in my book *Through These Doors* that New England Church, "building on the foundation of earlier years of advocacy for equal right of slaves, laid the cornerstone of a spiritual endeavor whose doorways would open upon the struggle for human rights in the future. The church's vow to take up the cause of human dignity when it clashed with the laws, creeds, or theologies that were deemed to be out of step with the intended purpose of the Gospel, would influence the church into the 21st century." So here we are, the product of our ancestors advocating for human dignity once again when we thought that the equal rights for people of all races, creeds, and gender had already been fought and won. But the reality of life is that nothing ever stays won.

On Saturday, March 2, 1861, two years before the Emancipation Proclamation of January 1, 1863, our NECC forebears drafted a preamble and resolution that was unanimously adopted. The whole of the document is recorded in my book on pages 16-17, but in part it says:

We as Christian men & women solemnly protest in the name of our holy religion against any compromise or concession that shall add to our responsibility for or complicity with the stupendous wrong of American Slavery...We hereby express our approval of the firmness manifested by the representation from this second congressional district, Hon. J. F. Farnsworth and his colleagues...and shall continue devoutly to pray that they may be able to withstand in this evil day, and have done all, to stand.

It is a sad commentary on humanity and society that we are still fighting the battle of prejudice, hatred, and social class. But we are. Evil rears its ugly head again through people with power and money who do what they can to squash and otherwise render to the sidelines people they don't like. Much of this is fueled by fearmongering and some in unbridled greed and power. All of it needs to be countered in the strongest most loving way possible. Working for human rights wherever they are violated is our most important mission. Jesus, who died because he opposed the political and religious systems that enslaved people, is our model.

Commitment to such causes is not easy, as our ancestors will attest, as they risked their lives to engage in the illegal activity of harboring slaves. As Christians we can do nothing less than embrace our indivisibility in the pursuit of liberty and justice for all.






