### MUSINGS

There is a statue that one encounters when traveling between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland that represents the hope for a peaceful and friendly, if not united, Ireland. The statue is of two men, one from each country, standing opposite each other, but with arms outstretched and hands almost touching in anticipation of a friendly handshake.

"We are a nation divided," writes Susan Beaumont, church consultant and spiritual director, "and those divisions are creeping into congregational life...Polarization is the division that occurs when a complex community falsely divides itself into sharply contrasting groups. Opposing sets of opinions or beliefs are used to foster a we/they mentality that forces people to declare their "side." [But] we don't have to accept polarity as the new status quo. There are specific things we can do to encourage the re-emergence of a healthy middle ground." She goes on to list ten ways to divert polarization to find middle ground.



While we don't have significant polarization at New England Church, I thought that these ideas would be helpful in our personal relationships with friends and colleagues with whom we have differing ideological perspectives.

Stay spiritually grounded. It is critical to remain non-anxious and connected to our faith. Fear, driven by the reactivity of others, cannot be our guiding force.

Maintain a sense of humor. Humor disappears as people polarize, so we must remember to laugh at ourselves.

**Regulate responses**. Be clear about your own feelings and don't let personal emotions cloud perceptions or opinions. Use "I" statements to express your feelings and to let others know how their behaviors impact you.

Focus your energy on health, not dysfunction. Negative people often command the attention, but stay with the health of a relationship or a conversation.

Clarify needs not positions. When people take a positional stance, help deescalate their position by focusing on what the underlying needs might be that prompt their intense reactions.

Challenge behaviors and ideas, not motives or worth. It is easy to make assumptions about the motives behind positions, and to project our biases on them as representatives of clusters of other beliefs. "If you believe this, then you must also stand for that."

Paraphrase the idea of others before responding. When you hear an idea or accusation that alarms you, pause before responding. Paraphrase first what you hear before expressing your own opinion.

Do not speak on behalf of others. In a polarized community, people like to speak on behalf of the group they perceive as theirs. When people speak on behalf of another, simply remind them to speak their own truth.

Start with what is possible. A return to healthy dialogue sometimes seems impossible but urge people to commit to one small step that you could take together. Success with one step will begin to restore trust.

Pray for one another. It is impossible for a community that is praying and caring for one another to stand in long-term opposition to one another. A genuine stance of prayer invites empathy, compassion, and reconciliation.

Peace and reconciliation to all of you as we live into the hope of Easter joy.

# Women's Fellowship


Mark your calendars now so you will be sure to join women from NECC at breakfast on Saturday, April 8 at Riverview Restaurant at 9:30 am.



5th & 6th graders used the Tiffany Rose Stained Glass Window as a starting point, then proceeded from the plagues outside the Chestnut Street church door, to the dirt floor in the boiler room under the sanctuary, on to the Scout room, up the secret staircase passages, through the chapel to Friendship Hall and the Source Theater to work collaboratively to find answers to historical questions about NECC. They found the church sacraments and the names of world religions embroidered on pew cushions in the chapel. Through These Doors by Gary McCann served as a reference guide for finding many of the answers including the name of Phillips Bros. & Co. store where the founders of NECC met before they had a church building for worship. Students said examining murals and exploring the church was an easy and fun way to learn about the NECC.

This learning experience was part of the 5/6th grade church school study of New England Congregational Church and the role it played in providing safe haven for runaway slaves traveling to Canada in the 1800's.
