

# MUSINGS

One of the most important facets of community life at New England Church is Sunday morning worship. And one of the most important facets of Sunday worship is music. We love hearing the organ and the hand bells; we love hearing the Chancel Choir and the Sunday school children sing.

But perhaps more important than any of these, though they are critical to creative worship, is the singing of hymns by the whole congregation. As we enter a new year of worship and singing, I want to reflect for a bit here about the value of hymns in worship.



First, hymns engage the whole congregation. We're not listening to someone else perform; we're singing together.

Second, hymns serve to move the worship service forward. Each hymn has a purpose: the first hymn is always a worship hymn, extoling the qualities of God. The second hymn is the Pulpit Hymn for good reason: it prepares us for the theme of the sermon. The third hymn summarizes the service, reiterates the sermon theme, or sends us on our way with a blessing and reminder that going forth to be the church in the world is our real service.


So, having said that, I would like to encourage everyone to be attentive to hymn singing.

- Sing, even if you can't carry a tune in a bucket, as my grandmother used to say. My dad always maintained that the scripture says "make a joyful noise to the Lord;" it doesn't say you have to sing on key.
- If you absolutely don't want to sing, that's ok. But follow the text as the rest of us sing. These words are more than adding music for variety. Joe, Martin, and I are diligent about choosing hymns that fit the theme of the day, as best we can. So follow the text in your hymnal as we prepare for the scripture and sermon.
- And whether you're singing, reading, or listening, **try to figure out why this particular hymn was chosen**. Sometimes the reference to the scripture or sermon theme is just one verse, but make a little exercise of deciding what it is. The hymns are meant for edification not just to make the service last for the hour.

We have resisted the popular trend to post the hymns on a screen, but choose instead to use the traditional hymnal. There's something about holding a book that I like. While I can read a book in electronic form, I like having a physical book in my hands. In the same way, I like having a hymnal in hand. The hymns we choose are hymns that have survived the ages. They've survived for good reason....they edify our soul, they extol the unconditional love of God, and they connect us to the church of the past, the present, and the future.

So join me in singing. Or following along, at least. I encourage you to open your hymnal, follow along, and sing with us, even if you don't utter a sound. It's what worshiping congregations do well together.


We're considering a publication at the church that would allow the congregation to post articles they are interested in selling as well as a venue for advertising

The Memorial Garden of the Saints, established in 2003, is a memorial garden for the interment of cremated remains in a serene setting that offers a place for respite and remembering. Located on the southeast side of the church building, on Chestnut Street, it is a place to remember loved ones who have been a part of the life of the church.

Members of the committee for The Memorial Garden of the Saints met recently and updated the policy. The following changes were approved by the church Cabinet.

Subscribers may now place their names on the Memorial Plaque located at the back of the Sanctuary in advance of being deceased. After the agreement has been signed and the required donation made, subscribers may request the plaque be updated to include their names. The donation for perpetual care of the Garden has increased to \$150. This is a one-time gift.


#### WINTER JUMP SUCCESS


The children are excited to be hosting coffee fellowship on February 18th. Please stop by after the service on the 18th and say hello!
