Dear Friends,

I have to admit, I've never been much of a fan of Spring. The calendar always says that it's here before mother nature acquiesces! Spring months are long and grey and filled with rain and occasional hope-filled, sun-filled days. And then summer hits with a smack! So far, Spring 2022 has been no different. And yet, deep down I know that winter—deep winter—is over and warmer temperatures, greener grass, and sweet-smelling spring flowers are really just around the corner.

In so many ways, the almost-but-not-yet of spring is reflected in our liturgical life as well. Lent is in its 5th week and Palm Sunday with its joy-filled music, palm branches, and shouts of "Hosanna" is just around the corner. But then comes Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and Holy Saturday. They interrupt the happy procession toward Easter with an almost unwelcome return to the somber and purple-filled days of the Lenten journey. And yet, the truth is, Easter Sunday, Resurrection Sunday, just doesn't feel quite as jubilant without going through those more somber days.

This year, I'd like to invite you to remain with us in the pre-Easter darkness a little longer. We'll be coming together for a special service on Maundy Thursday, April 14, at 7:00 p.m. This will be a service of Tenebrae, a service of shadows. Marked by the extinguishing of lights and candles, this ancient form of worship leads us deeper into the shadows and sets the stage for a dramatic return to light on Easter morning. Punctuated by a variety of special music, Communion, and readings from Jesus' final 24 hours, this deeply moving service is sure to be one you'll remember throughout the year. I hope you'll consider joining us.

This Lenten and Easter season, my personal hope for you and for us is summarized beautifully in this brief quotation from author Molly Fumia:

Resurrection. The reversal of what was thought to be absolute. The turning of midnight into dawn, hatred into love, dying into living anew. If we look more closely into life, we will find that resurrection is more than hope, it is our experience... We have come back to life, not only when we start to shake off a shroud of sorrow that bound us, but when we begin to believe in all that is still, endlessly possible.¹

We remain in the shadows together only a little longer. A new hope is on the horizon.



The elevator door opens. A cow stands inside, angled diagonally to fit. It doesn't look uncomfortable, merely impatient. "It is for the housewarming ceremony on the third floor," explains the woman who stands behind the cow, holding it loosely with a rope. She has the sheepish look of a person caught in a strange situation who is trying to act as normal as possible. She introduces herself as Sarala and smiles reassuringly. The door closes. I shake my head and suppress a grin.



When Shoba Narayan—who has just returned to India with her husband and two daughters after years in the United States—asks whether said cow might bless her apartment next, it is the beginning of a beautiful friendship between our author and Sarala, who also sells fresh milk right across the street from that thoroughly modern apartment building. The two women connect over not only cows but also family, food, and life. When Shoba agrees to buy Sarala a new cow, they set off looking for just the right heifer, and what was at first a simple economic transaction becomes something much deeper, though never without a hint of slapstick.

The Milk Lady of Bangalore immerses us in the culture, customs, myths, religion, sights, and sounds of a city in which the twenty-first century and the ancient past coexist like nowhere else in the world. It's a true story of bridging divides, of understanding other ways of looking at the world, and of human connections and animal connections, and it's an irresistible adventure of two strong women and the animals they love.

5TH & 6TH GRADE


