

CHANGES COMING TO OUR **EDUCATION PROGRAM**

The last few ministry years have been challenging for churches around the country. Our New England Education team has had to be very flexible and creative to keep things going through the pandemic and to restart our in-person programs in the aftermath of all that uncertainty. We are so grateful to Desiree Guzman, Lesley Myers, Kathy Kokkinos, and Jenni Moses for their leadership this year (and for many previous years of service.)

Though momentum is building again post-pandemic, we still have not returned to the giving levels or attendance that we were used to in the past. In light of the nearly \$77,000 deficit in this year's budget and with the goal of better reflecting our current and future needs, some staffing changes will be made beginning on June 1st of 2023. Desiree's position of Director of Education Ministries will transition from $\frac{3}{4}$ time to $\frac{1}{2}$ time and the scope of her work will shift from overseeing children and youth of all ages, to working specifically with infants - 5th grade. The title for this position will also change to Director of Children's Ministries. The positions of our two Youth Sunday School Teachers, currently filled by Lesley & Kathy, will be eliminated. As will the position of Nursery Director that Jenni Moses holds. The nursery will continue to be staffed by paid hourly attendants. Scheduling of attendants and volunteers will now be handled by our Director of Children's Ministry.

Also, due to lower summer attendance, there will be no church school or nurserv care offered this summer. Instead we will focus our time, energy, and budget on planning a strong ministry year beginning in the fall. Desiree will provide new and improved activity folders and bags for children to use during indoor summer worship services, and a bin of fun activities available during our outdoor services. These reductions in cost will allow us to create a new 10 hours/week position for a Director of Youth Ministries. This person will work with youth $(6^{th} 12^{th} \text{ grade})$ and their families, and will be responsible for Sunday morning Youth Group, Confirmation, and additional programming outside of Sunday mornings.


Even with the new position, these changes will result in an annual savings of approximately \$18,000. Further, they better align with the goals identified by our strategic visioning process, and will open the door to creating this position with a sole focus on youth programming – something that we believe to be vital for us to be a healthy and vibrant church moving forward.

Though change can sometimes be painful, it is also the way we grow. These changes are not about giving up because of the financial pressures of the moment. They are about investing in a stronger, brighter, more sustainable future.

From the Students of the Beloved Community Committee

Aurora history starts with the McCarty brothers' two mills in the 1830's. By 1850 Black folks had begun to arrive. Yet it wasn't until 2005 that Dennis Buck would publish the first chronicle of our city's Black history, From Slavery to Students *Glory*. You can get a copy at the Historical Society store, 20 E. Downer Pl. They of the Beloved also offer a startling book, just out in 2022, Blackface: Minstrelsy in Aurora, Illinois, Community by Alejandro Benavides. Did you know minstrel shows were the rock concerts of their time? If you prefer an upbeat book about Black Aurora, check out Gentle Spirit, a book about the life of Marie Wilkinson. You can order or buy it at the Marie Wilkinson Food Pantry at 834 N Highland Ave.

Aurora was often a microcosm of what was happening in the nation, both for good and ill. You might say our current era is focused on learning what in past eras our culture failed to see. That is the learning we Students of the Beloved Community are doing and inviting you to do.

The turnout for April's field trip to the "The Negro Tourist Green Book" Exhibit was one of our biggest attendances. New England is clearly on board in this journey of understanding. Next will be our annual attendance at the Juneteenth celebration on June 17 at Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Park, 42 N. Farnsworth Ave. We will go as a group. It will be a fun chance to experience our Black neighbors in their world, not ours. Save the date.

Read one book or all. It's up to you! Books are suggested by participants and voted on twice a year. Contact Sue Reimer to obtain a book and the Zoom link.


May 16: "Book Woman's Daughter" (The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek,2)by Kim Michelle Richardson.



NO WEEKLY SUMMER CHURCH SCHOOL THIS YEAR:




The Aurora Area Interfaith Food Pantry

The mission of the AAIFP is "to help end local hunger by ensuring everyone has enough access to nourishing food, thereby helping our overall community stay healthy and productive." They accomplish this through food distribution programs, where those in need select foods from the pantry or the pantry brings food to those who cannot come in person. There are opportunities to volunteer at the pantry or at off-site locations, called mobile pantries, or pop-up shops. Volunteers must be 14+ years old. The needs facing our neighbors are growing. And while the AAIFP is meeting the needs of many in our community, they cannot do it alone. They depend greatly on volunteers to help achieve their mission!
