Dear Friends,

Each year, we remember the first Christmas, the proclamation of an angel to frightened shepherds, and a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom God favors!" This year, the heavenly host is notably absent from the night sky and peace seems as elusive as ever. But that won't stop us from preparing for the possibility with decorations and gifts; won't stop us from lighting a candle for peace on the second Sunday of Advent; won't stop us from sending holiday greetings of peace to friends and family; won't stop us from singing about peace in numerous carols and songs; and won't stop us from praying for it.

Recently, the clergy group with which I meet wanted to do something concrete to try and make some peace locally. With the rise of violence toward Jewish and Muslim people in the U.S. and around the world, we decided to reach out to local synagogues and mosques by sending a letter of solidarity and peace. Here are a few lines from that letter:

We want you to know that we stand in solidarity with you, our neighbors...

We affirm the value of your religious and spiritual tradition...

We firmly believe that our community is enriched by the diversity of religious and spiritual beliefs to be found here...

In a few days, several members of that same clergy group will host an ecumenical prayer service for peace at St. David's Episcopal Church on December 3<sup>rd</sup> at 1 p.m. We hope that you'll consider joining us.

Sometimes, it's a struggle to know how to respond when conflict threatens the security of our world and innocent people suffer. We can feel overwhelmed and powerless. We can become convinced that there's just nothing we can do to make a difference. But the truth is, there's always something we can do.


Perhaps you know someone who needs to hear a message of solidarity and affirmation. Maybe there's a neighbor or coworker that would feel seen and valued by a plate of holiday goodies. It could be that simply gathering with other people of faith to pray for peace will make it seem just a little more possible.

However you choose to do it this season, let's all try and make the Christmas promise of peace a little more of a reality in our world.





# SALVATION ARMY BELL RINGING

If you would like to participate by placing one of the decorations, please stop in the Narthex before entering Johnson Chapel or the Sanctuary.




# THE CHRISTMAS FUND

active and retired clergy and lay employees. We will collect this special offering on Sunday, December 10.






# A Service of Prayers for Peace in a Time of Global Unrest






## ADDITIONAL PARKING






