

Dear Friends,

We've made it through the long and shadowy days of Advent, are more than halfway through the joy and revelry of the 12-day season of Christmas, and now we stand on the precipice of a new season in the life of the church: Epiphany. The season of Epiphany begins on January 6 with the celebration of *Dia' de Reyes*, Theophany, *Timkat*, *Pasko ng Matatanda*, *Denha*, or Three Kings Day, commemorating the arrival of the wise ones to the child Jesus and their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The season of Epiphany lasts until Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024.

As the name implies, Epiphany is all about revelation. It begins with Jesus' revelation to the magi and throughout the season Jesus' character and purpose are revealed in new ways. It all culminates with the Transfiguration, when Jesus is transformed on the mountaintop and a voice from a cloud says, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Epiphany is known as the season of light, mirroring the lengthening of days that occurs in nature following the Winter Solstice. The light of a bright star guides the magi to Jesus and the lectionary readings bring Jesus into greater and greater focus as the season unfolds, shedding light on who he was and what he was about in the world.

Epiphany is great time for us, as individuals and as a church, to be asking the same things: Who are we and what are we to be about in the world? The light of that Bethlehem star still shines, illuminating greater truths about us and about New England Church. Who are we and what are we going to be about in 2024? Epiphany is the perfect time to follow the star and see where it leads.

Please join us and make beautiful music in a relaxed, not stressful atmosphere. We hope to see you there!



Women's Fellowship



We, at NECC who desire to make the world a better place, continue to post volunteer opportunities in this section of the Tidings every month. This month, Christine's Dream Equestrian Center, is featured which provides therapeutic riding opportunities for individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorders. You can become an Equine Program Volunteer:

We are looking for volunteers to be Side-Walkers and Horse Leaders during weekly therapeutic riding lessons located at Rich Harvest Farms in Sugar Grove. We are a PATH Intl. (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International) Premier Accredited Center serving young adults on the Autism Spectrum.

Therapeutic riding helps individuals with physical, emotional, behavioral and cognitive challenges by utilizing the movement of the horse to benefit the rider. Additionally, Equine Assisted Activities provide opportunities for experiential education, vocational skills development, and recreational skill development.



Benefits of Equine Assisted Activities & Therapies include, but are not limited to:

Physical: Improved motor skills, increased strength, balance and range of motion Cognitive: Improved motor planning, attention span, following directions Social/Emotional: Promotes independence, self-confidence, self-control

We are currently looking for volunteers Monday - Thursday mornings, and Friday times TBD

Requirements:

Must be 16 years or older.

Previous experience working with horses is NOT required. Equine Program Volunteers receive training to provide assistance to the horses, PATH Instructor and riders during therapeutic riding instruction.

Available to attend a 1-hour Orientation/Training prior to start of the volunteer service.
